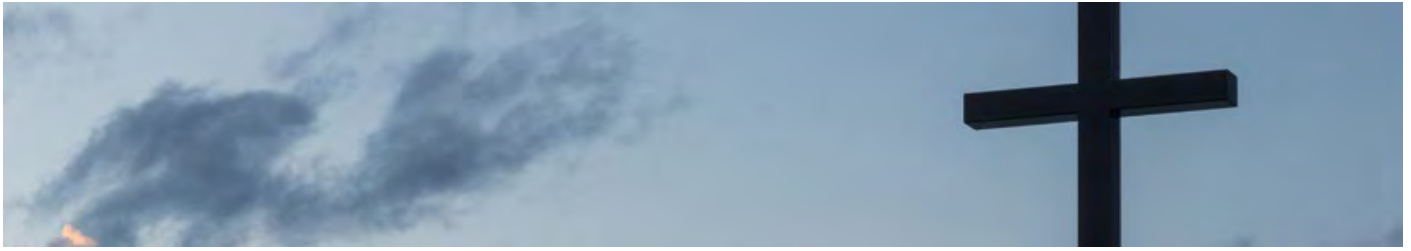




29 & 30 August – Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A



**First Reading** *Jer 20: 7-9* A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

The word of the Lord God has meant derision for me. You have seduced me, Lord, and I have let myself be seduced; you have overpowered me: you were the stronger.

I am a daily laughing-stock, everybody's butt. Each time I speak the word, I have to howl and proclaim: 'Violence and ruin!' The word of the Lord has meant for me insult, derision, all day long. I used to say, I will not think about him, I will not speak in his name any more. Then there seemed to be a fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones. The effort to restrain it wearied me, I could not bear it.

**Gospel** *Mt 16: 21-27* A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself.

Jesus began to make it clear to his disciples that he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life? 'For the Son of Man is going to come in the glory of his Father with his angels, and, when he does, he will reward each one according to his behaviour.

## REFUGEE AND ASYLUM SEEKER GROUP ANNUAL APPEAL

Although our parish volunteers are unable to visit families during the COVID19 pandemic they are still getting many requests for extra assistance. Our wonderful volunteers are still managing to offer support; a phone call, a chat, some help with a pharmacy bill, baby needs, winter clothes etc. As one mother said recently, 'It means the world to us to have the support of the parish.'

Among refugee families increasing mental health issues are a growing concern. During this time of isolation at least one family member has needed extra mental health support. Other adults, some who have been waiting for up to seven years for a permanent visa, have reached out for extra counselling support.

**SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY 30 AUGUST** The annual Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC) Social Justice Statement is this year titled: To Live Life to the Full: Mental health in Australia today.

The COVID-19 pandemic is impacting the mental health of many members of our communities. In fact, most of us will experience a mental health problem at some point over the course of our lives. Understanding mental health helps us to be aware of those who need our support. Our parishes, organisations and communities can be places of acceptance care and healing.

The ACBC welcomes the deinstitutionalisation of mental health care in Australia. However, without adequately funded community mental health services, there is a gap in the system through which people continue to fall. Social determinants including poverty, living conditions, and personal security are significant contributors to mental ill-health. This year's social justice statement highlights the experience of First Nations people and communities, asylum seekers and refugees, people who are homeless and those who are in prison.

The Bishops observe that "our society tends to draw away from, or to push away, those who confront us with our frailties and limitations" which is "completely at odds with the story of Jesus" who "takes on the frailty of the human condition" and "draws near to those who are sick or who have disabilities, those who are marginalized or despised". People living with mental ill-health are part of the Body of Christ – 'us' and not 'them' – and share equally in Jesus' promise of the fullness of life (Jn 10:10).

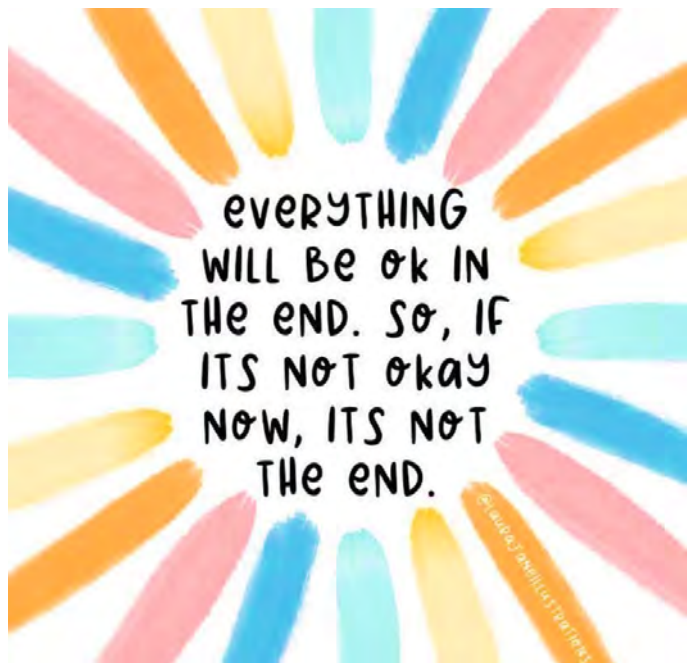
The ACBC invite us all to reject stigmatisation, to work for the transformation of social determinants of mental ill-health, and to call for policies and service provision that meets the needs of the poorest and most marginalised members of our community.

## MESSAGE FROM FR JOHN TO OUR SCHOOL COMMUNITY

Dear friends at St Therese's School,

As parish priest here in Essendon, with lockdown going on and on, with Stage 4 restrictions, I thought I'd send a greeting from my hermitage here in semi-seclusion, where at least I can still get out for a walk to, and along the Maribyrnong River. The sun is shining today, and springtime is almost here, with the coronavirus daily numbers declining, so we are slowly moving forward in the right direction, masks, physical distancing and all!

It has been a very strange experience for me as a priest for 42 years, now recording Masses in the church for weekends and weekdays, solo, for nearly an incredible 6 months now, but it's the simplest and most effective way to go, given the circumstances. At least it is a means of communicating and connecting with the parish community, through the parish website, in some way. We are learning to do things differently in all sorts of ways, not that it's easy to make the adjustments required.

And that brings me to the whole school situation, where teachers, students, parents, carers and support staff have had to make great changes to their regular daily routine. I can only express admiration and appreciation for what I can see as the conscientious commitment, concern and care demonstrated for our students and each other in general, by all involved in doing our best to continue the process of learning and engaging with each other, albeit virtually, at a distance, from home.

There is no doubt that the added stresses are there to deal with, in not being able to engage face to face physically with each other and our teachers and helpers. The challenges of change, innovation and adaptation are real, but there is some benefit too in using these new methods of learning. Also appreciated are the demands placed on parents, with the need to balance home life, on-line learning supervision and working from home as well. The frustrations are real, but I'd like to acknowledge with admiration, the way in which you have taken up the challenges with such willingness and enthusiasm.

Perhaps the most difficult situation is with those who are older and infirm, especially in aged care, who can't get out at all, and where isolation is limiting their physical contact with their families. And, as we know, the risk to health as we age, increases significantly, so the precautions are necessary for the good of all, difficult as it may seem.

With this in mind, I have to say how impressed I was, when I viewed the [recent video of our young people from St Therese's School](#) sending messages, with greetings and words of encouragement, concern and care to those older members of our community, at home, in aged care, and not only in our parish community, but also beyond. This wonderful initiative has really been a great way of involving and engaging, and has had a very positive and affirming response from those who have tuned in. There is no doubt that those receiving the messages are given a lift in their spirits, to know that they are remembered, in our thoughts, good wishes and prayers.

Thanks to our principal, Michael Di Nuzzo, the leadership team, and all of our staff, for the way in which all have faced up to the challenges of ongoing on-line education and adapting to doing things in new ways. In particular, I commend David Rulli and helpers, for their support, with the project of connecting with our seniors. There is also a further video of [Year 5 students reflecting on 'Faith'](#), a further means of communicating a message of hope and the spiritual dimension of the mission we are called to as Christians, on our journey of faith at whatever stage of life we are, young or old. Well done to those who contributed their thoughts on this topic too.

All reflects credit on our students and school community overall, demonstrating the spirit of good will and thoughtfulness of so many. We can be reassured that we are in a great place here, there for one another and doing what we can to work our way through this daunting and anxious time, where the common good of all is our primary concern.

Of course, there remains the question of where we go from here with our parish sacramental program, and I quite understand the concerns of parents and candidates, particularly in Years 4 and 6, who look forward to the important celebrations of faith with First Eucharist and Confirmation, as key moments in our growth in faith in our Catholic tradition, following the way of Jesus and living his message.

Frustrating as it may be, there is just no certainty at all about possible dates or determining ways in which this can be done, even in smaller numbers, until the gradual transition to opening up again for public worship in our churches. Naturally, we hope this will be possible later in the year, for Term 4 some time, but we just have to wait patiently and see what might be do-able.

We are in unprecedented times, and this scenario must come to an end eventually, hopefully sooner than later, but no promises can be made about much at all, at the moment. Whatever might be said about a coronavirus vaccine in the future, the requirements of experimentation, testing, evaluation and implementation all take time, and there's no magic solution meanwhile, apart from observing the required precautions.

Hoping we all keep safe and in good health, patient, positive and in good spirits.

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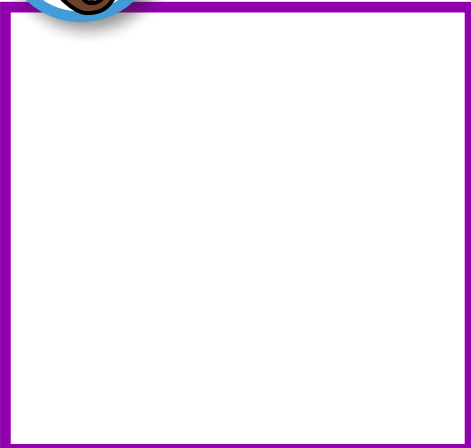

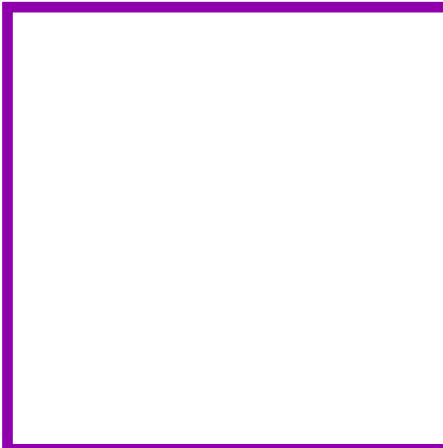
