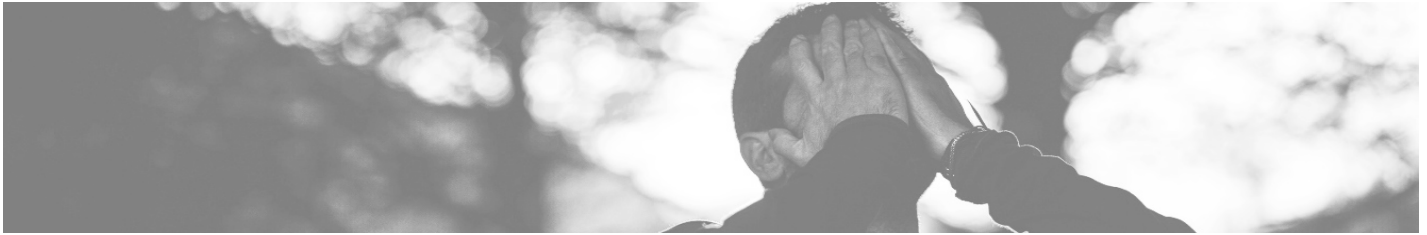

First Reading *Jer 31: 7-9* A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

I shall lead them back in mercy – both the blind and the lame.

The Lord says this: Shout with joy for Jacob! Hail the chief of nations! Proclaim! Praise! Shout: The Lord has saved his people, the remnant of Israel! See, I will bring them back from the land of the North and gather them from the far ends of earth; all of them: the blind and the lame, women with child, women in labour: a great company returning here. They had left in tears, I will comfort them as I lead them back; I will guide them to streams of water, by a smooth path where they will not stumble. For I am a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my first-born son.

Gospel *Mk 10: 46-52* A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Master, grant that I may see.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.



Throughout this liturgical year we have examined several aspects of our faith. We have pondered the history of our salvation, the merciful compassion of God, God's willingness to lead us out of the bondage of our addictions. We have meditated often and long on the person of Jesus, on his life and death, on the meaning of his sacrifice, on his resurrection, on his influence in our lives today. We have considered our own ongoing transformation as disciples of Jesus, baptised into his death and resurrection, commissioned to bring the news of his love to all those with whom we come into contact. We have reflected on all of these wonderful deeds of God, and now we must ask the question: What difference has it made?

Have we merely acquired some information about the biblical readings, about our religious ancestors, about the ministry of Jesus and the life of the early church? Or have our eyes really been opened; have we been enabled to leave behind whatever prevents us from living the Christian life fully, to abandon our exiles or the trappings of our former lives? Have we accepted more genuinely the Christian responsibilities that are ours as baptised followers of Christ, in our own personal lives, in our families, in our relationships with others, at the workplace? To what degree have

we been transformed into Christ? How open have we become to the action of the Spirit in our lives? Have we been made a new creation? And do we recognise Christ in our midst? © Dianne Bergant CSA

JUMPED UP BARTIMAEUS Bartimaeus sat on the side of the way, having pilgrims throw coins onto his cloak spread out before him. But the presence of Jesus encouraged him to abandon his cloak, jump up from his ground level existence and ask to truly see the way from Jesus' perspective. Jesus responded to this act of faith by curing the disease so that Bartimaeus could see ahead in the same way as Jesus and follow him on 'the Way' (the earliest name for Christianity).

You and I can remain with the security of a familiar existence, hoping to be tossed a few coins of consolation to satisfy our various hungers. But Jesus wants us to take courage, to jump up and to share his vision. This takes faith, but we are in a better situation than Bartimaeus. He knew only that Jesus was on the way from Jericho to Jerusalem. We believe that, in Jerusalem, Jesus was lifted well above ground level and then had the astounding victory over the worst that death could do.

We might pause for a moment to pray for the courage to abandon whatever is keeping us grounded, so that with Bishop Richard of Chichester we may see Christ more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

The 2021 World Mission Month campaign produced locally by Catholic Mission has attracted global attention, but more importantly gives an international voice to missionaries serving people in places where poverty and disadvantage compound the devastating impact of COVID-19.

The digital campaign connected mission partners from around the world. It responds to a call from Pope Francis, inspired by Acts 4:20: "For we cannot keep from speaking about what we have seen and heard." Catholic Mission National Director, Fr Brian Lucas, says this global campaign focuses on the importance of sharing faith in mission. "It is the expression of the solidarity among the local churches in support of the mission churches that are in need because of persecution, minority status, and lack of material resources."

In the lead up to World Mission Sunday on October 24, Catholic Mission's annual World Mission Month Appeal has highlighted the work of the Good Shepherd Sisters in Thailand, supporting children from vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds through the Kindergarten Centre.

"The work of the Good Shepherd Sisters in Thailand touches some of the most vulnerable women and children and is an expression of the concern the local church has to give witness to the promise of the fullness of life," says Fr Brian.

This week Catholic Mission share the story of Churai*, who, having experienced much heartbreak in childhood, turned to the Mother and Babies Home run by the Good Shepherd Sisters in Bangkok when she experienced rejection as an adult, abandoned by her partner and pregnant. ROADMAP OUT OF LOCKDOWN FOR OUR PARISH



With vaccination rates rising and the easing of restrictions approaching, we now look forward to a time of welcoming parishioners back to Mass and to celebrating the Sacrament of First Eucharist with our school and RE Programme candidates. At St Therese's we will be following the CHO directives in opening up our Masses.

OPENING UP DATES

- We are still working towards opening for Masses on the 6 November and in the meantime we are working hard to prepare for opening under requirements of the CHO directives.
- At this stage our first in-person Masses will take place on the weekend of 6 and 7 November.
- School First Eucharist Masses are booked for 26, 27 and 28 November. These Masses are not open to the public. (see Parish Dates below for details)
- The new date for our RE Programme Eucharist Mass is Sunday 5 December at 10.30am. This Mass is open to the public.
- Online Mass will continue to be recorded on weekends until restrictions ease further.

VACCINATION REQUIREMENTS

St Therese's will be adhering to CHO directives on double-dosed vaccination requirements so that we can welcome the maximum number of people back to a safe environment in our church.

- All parish office staff are required to be double-dose vaccinated in order to return to work in the parish office.
- All volunteers are required to be double-dosed vaccinated by opening on 5 November in order to attend Masses and continue their ministry.
- All Mass attendees over the age of 16 are required to be double-dosed vaccinated. This allows us to welcome 150 people back to Mass once we reopen.
- People of unknown vaccination status will not be allowed to attend Mass at St Therese's under the CHO directive.



BOOKING AND CHECKING IN

We have decided that with 150 people allowed at Mass, we won't need to set up a booking system for our usual weekday and weekend Masses.

All attendees are still required to check in using the Service Victoria QR codes in our church.

All attendees will be required to show proof of double-dose vaccination so please bring along your printed or digital certificate.

People of unknown vaccination status will not be allowed to attend Mass at St Therese's under the CHO directive. If you cannot prove your vaccination status, you will not be allowed to attend Mass.

CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS Our parish centenary is another event we look forward to celebrating as a parish. Our Parish was formed on 8 August 1922 with the first Church/School building in the Parish ready for use in March 1923. The opening day of the school was 9 April 1923. The Parish Leadership Team has agreed to the celebration of our Parish Centenary from 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023. This period covers the establishment of the Parish and the Parish School. The later start also gives more time for planning following our year of lockdown and recognises that it may be some time before Sunday Mass attendance builds up to previous numbers. It is hoped the celebration of the centenary will lead to the numbers increasing. The Theme for our Centenary is "A Faith Community Where Everyone is Welcome". The Centenary Mass will be celebrated on Sunday 6 November 2022. Sr Cathy Meese will coordinate the planning for that Mass. When restrictions are lifted our Centenary Planning Committee will be able to proceed with the planning of events to celebrate the establishment of our Parish and School.

Gospel Mk 10:35-45

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him, 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'

When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them: 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'
