First Reading Sir 3: 17-20, 28-29 A reading from the book of Ecclesiasticus

Humble yourself and you will find favour with the Lord.

My son, be gentle in carrying out your business, and you will be better loved than a lavish giver. The greater you are, the more you should behave humbly, and then you will find favour with the Lord; for great though the power of the Lord is, **he accepts the homage of the humble. There is no cure for the proud man's malady**, since an evil growth has taken root in him. The heart of a sensible man will reflect on parables, **an attentive ear is the sage's dream.**

Gospel Lk 14: 1. 7-14 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

All who exalt themselves shall be humbled and all who humble themselves shall be exalted.

On a Sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. **He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'**

Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

INTERCESSIONS

God is the giver of all good gifts. Let us now pray to him for our needs, and for the needs of the Church and the world.

For the Church throughout the world, that we might listen to the voices of those made powerless with openness, and respond with practical and prayerful sensitivity to the complex social realities of violence and abuse in our own communities and beyond.

We pray for the success of Legacy week: As we remember the sacrifices made by Australian soldiers and their families giving toward Legacy week is another way of showing our support.

We pray for faith communities and organisations working with victims of abuse and violence: That we might engage with the complex personal and structural issues around violence and abuse with intelligence and integrity, courage and compassion, tenacity and truth.

We pray for the people of Ukraine, still enduring the hardships of war six months on from the invasion of Russian forces.

We pray for the children presenting as candidates for First Eucharist this weekend. May they have support within their family and from our parish community on their faith journey.

We pray for those who are ill, especially: Kerri Geary, Dawn Ward, Sr Mary Dennett, Toni Lukauskas, Ana Costea, Laurie Larmer, Maree O'Shea, Don and Nancy Woodall and Neville Quiah.

We pray for our own special needs.

Merciful God, fill our hearts with your love and keep us faithful to you and to the Gospel. Grant this through Christ our Lord. AMEN

SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY Each year, the Australian Catholic Bishops release a major social justice statement for Social Justice Sunday. The statements encourage the Catholic community to reflect and act on social, economic and ecological issues. In their statement for 2022-2023, *'Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse'*, the Bishops add their voice to global campaigns to confront and call out destructive attitudes and behaviours that lead to life-limiting and long-lasting impacts on many vulnerable members of our families, churches, and society.
